## A NOTE FROM DCN. GEORGE . . .

**I**n our Gospel reading for this Sunday, Jesus calls the fishermen — Simon, Andrew, James and John, to follow him. All of us have a calling. I am reminded of my own call to the Diaconate. It happened back in 1993. I was involved with the Choir at Immaculate Conception Church and working at IBM in Endicott, NY. One day while playing the song, “Here I am Lord” at Mass, I felt something that I never felt before. I felt as if God was calling me to do something more. After much prayer and in talking to a variety of people, it became clear that I should look into becoming a Deacon. The road to being a Deacon was hard. I decided to leave my job at IBM because my job required a lot of travel. Unfortunately, I had a hard time finding a new job. I was told by the head of the Diaconal Admissions that I would not be accepted unless I had a job. Gradually, we ran out of money and we were getting desperate when I got a call from an old friend asking me if I was still looking for a job. I ended up getting hired at Cornell University, and I was able to progress in the Deacon Admission process. There were still many tests and interviews, and the four years of training and getting a Master’s Degree while I worked full-time, but in the end, I was ordained in May of 1998.

I really didn’t know what God had in store for me as a Deacon and what I would end up doing. During these past 18 years, I have done prison ministry, hospital ministry, visiting the homebound, preaching and liturgy, counseling, weddings, baptisms and funerals and much more. God calls us to do many things. St. Paul famously said: “Now you are Christ’s body, and individually parts of it” (1 Cor 12:27) and “there are different forms of service but the same Lord” (1 Cor 12:5). There are many ways that we can serve God and each other. Many of you volunteer and help with set up and meals and bringing communion and visiting the sick and so many other ways. The word “deacon” is derived from the Greek word “diakonoi” — which means “to serve” — so in many ways, we are all deacons, as long as we work to bring God’s love and peace to the world.

## GOOD NEWS

His First Followers — We began the Church year with the foundations of our Christian life. We focused on our baptismal call to preach the word of God. Now we focus on the call of the first apostles. Today’s painting is again from the Sistine Chapel, where Ghirlandaio based this scene on today’s Gospel. The Sea of Galilee spreads out behind Jesus, who is once again front and center. Several towns line the shore and remind us of Capernaum, where Jesus lived and near where he called his first followers. Two apostles kneel in front of Jesus; another pair stand behind him. Their gestures and postures reveal their interior attitudes. One apostle crosses his arms in acceptance while another prayerfully looks up at Jesus. The third apostle, behind Jesus, has his hand at his chest as if to say, “Are you sure you want me?” The fourth seems to look away. Many others surround Jesus, but not all of them are called to be apostles. The call of Jesus is real. He may not ask us to leave behind our business or family, but he does ask for the same totality of trust and following. The result of fully saying “yes” to this call is what the first reading proclaims: “You have brought them abundant joy and great rejoicing; They rejoice before you as people rejoice at harvest...” (Isaiah 9:2). The “joy of the gospel” that Pope Francis proclaimed in his 2013 apostolic exhortation is exactly this: that joy that comes from a sincere and generous “yes” to Jesus’ call to be a disciple. —Fr. Mark Haydu, LC

## ask Padre

***1 Corinthians 10:13 states, “God...will not let you be tried beyond your strength; but with the trial he will also provide a way out....” My brother committed suicide, and I wonder why he wasn’t “able to bear it.” Please help me to understand.***

The death of a family member is never easy to deal with. I pray for your peace and your brother’s eternal rest. We can’t be sure what your brother was thinking when he ended his life, but we can be certain God was with him. God remains faithful to his covenant and will never disappoint the hope and trust of his children. Does this mean your brother failed to trust in God? We don’t know that. Only God and your brother know the extent of his condition and suffering. When we recall Jesus’ lament from the cross—“My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?” (Matthew 27:46; Psalm 22:2)—we see that in his darkest moment, his Father was with him. In the same way, God was present in the worst of your brother’s trials. Why he was nevertheless unable to bear them is a question we may never have the answer to on this side of heaven. It’s important to remember that the Church has great compassion for those who commit suicide. To leave your brother in God’s merciful hands is to act with the conviction of our faith. Fr. 

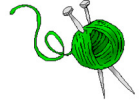

Nothing in proposed NY legislation to legalize assisted suicide requires that patients be counseled or screened for clinical depression before they are handed a lethal prescription. Yet mental health professionals know that a large number of suicides could be prevented with the right therapeutic intervention. New York State recognizes suicide as a critical public health concern and works to prevent it. Government should not reverse course now and send the message that some suicides are acceptable.
