

## A NOTE FROM DCN. GEORGE . . .

In the second reading for today, St. Paul writes in his Letter to the Romans: “We know that all things work for good for those who love God...(Rom. 8:28).” I think of that phrase quite a lot, especially when things in my life go badly. It makes me think about an incident in the life of Presbyterian Minister and former Chaplain to the United States Senate, Peter Marshall. In the 1940’s, Peter was a popular and well-known preacher, but on one night in January of 1949, he suffered a painful heart attack. His wife, Catherine called for an ambulance and then prayed that God would bring good out of this, their latest difficulty. Peter, though he was well known for his faith and trust in God, looked up at his wife and asked “What good could possibly come out of this?”

How many times have we thought the same thing when hardships and troubles, loss of a loved one, or loss of a job have hit us. Some people may say: “God has plan” or “unite your suffering with Christ,” which we should—but at the time of that suffering, it is hard to see what good can come of it.

Moments of tragedy and suffering are difficult times for us, but they can also be transforming moments for us as well. We need to know that God is constantly sending us His grace and love, but we need to be receptive to His gifts. Solomon, in our first reading, received the gift of Wisdom from God, but he squandered his gifts from God and fell into sin and idolatry and lost everything.

St. Paul, the author of our second reading, accepted the gifts that God gave him and dedicated his life to doing God’s Will. No stranger to suffering and hardships, Paul is quoted as saying in the Letter to Timothy: “I have run the race and have stayed the course (2 Tim 4:7).” Unlike Solomon, Paul’s faith sustained him until the end.

Jesus, in our Gospel reading, tells us a parable of people who find a treasure and do everything they can to keep it. Faith in God is such a treasure.

Now, you may wonder what ever happened to Peter Marshall. He died that January in 1949, but his death transformed his wife. At his death bed, Catherine Marshall saw a vision of her husband luminously rising to heaven with Jesus. Peter’s death caused his wife to continue his work and God’s work as an author and lecturer touching thousands of lives. So, in the end, good did come from Peter’s suffering.

As Peter Marshall once said: “Do we trust God enough to put the ultimates of life—the things affecting health, life and death and basic economic needs—into his hands? If we do, that—in God’s eyes—is faith. And He will always honor it.”

## GOOD NEWS

**The richly decorated portrait *The Vision of Saint Helena* by Paolo Veronese is immediately impressive.** Helena, a woman of humble origins, became the wife of Constantius Chlorus (Rome’s emperor from 293–306). An innkeeper’s daughter in an outback town, her beauty caught the eye of the most powerful man on earth. She went from rags to riches. Here she wears lush, Eastern fabrics with woven prints and royal colors. The gold and blue details of her dress and the valour of her crimson cape broached under her chin denote the wealth her position afforded. She rests on a highback leather throne; an elegant textile wall covering provides a background from floor to ceiling. The softly flowing fabrics and her serene posture exude calm and focus our attention on her tranquil face and spirit of contemplation. No matter the power, wealth, and beauty of the world surrounding her, Helena has forsaken all to pursue the true treasure she possesses as a Christian and values more than the rest. Helena traveled from Rome to Jerusalem to bring back the relics of Christ’s passion. These reminders of Jesus’ love for sinners became the most important treasures of Christendom. Veronese wants to convince us that through prayer we come to understand our treasure is not found in wealth but in the glorious vestment of baptismal faith. As adopted sons and daughters of the king, we become like St. Helena: poor commoners raised to royalty! Thank God for his gift of life in Christ and allow your heart to follow the inspirations he shares with you. For Reflection Saint Helena left the comfort of her home to search for the cross of Christ. What are you searching for? What are you willing to give up for it? Fr. Mark Haydu, LC

## ask Padre

***Is it a sin to purchase goods and services from a business that financially supports morally objectionable behavior?***

This question requires us to back up a bit and ask two more fundamental questions: “What is sin?” and “To what degree am I allowed to participate in an objective evil?” A moral action has three necessary components: the object, the intention, and the circumstances. These are the what, the why, and the context. For something to be sinful, all three of these components must be taken into account. I must know what I am doing is sinful, I must fully intend it, and there must not be any mitigating circumstances that lessen my degree of culpability. Sin, in other words, requires knowledge that the action is sinful, the will to perform it, and circumstances that do not unduly inhibit my knowledge and freedom to act. To purchase goods and services from a business that supports morally objectionable behavior is sinful if we are conscious that the business supports such behavior, if we intend to purchase the product as a way of showing our support of this morally objectionable behavior, and if there are no mitigating circumstances inhibiting our knowledge and freedom of action. As a general rule, we should avoid purchasing goods and services from such businesses. We should not, for example, buy products from companies that fund grave objective moral evils such as embryonic stem research, contraception, abortion, assisted suicide, capital punishment, or euthanasia. Specific cases must also take into account the distinction between grave and less serious matters. Fr. Dennis J. Billy, CSsR



## Feast Day — July 31



**Saint Ignatius of Loyola** (Basque: *Ignazio Loiolakoa*, Spanish: *Ignacio de Loyola*; c. October 23, 1491– July 31, 1556) was a Spanish Basque priest and theologian, who founded the religious order called the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) and became its first Superior General. The Jesuit order served the Pope as missionaries, and they were bound by a vow of special obedience to the sovereign pontiff in regard to the missions. They, therefore, emerged as an important political force during the time of the Counter-Reformation.

Ignatius is remembered as a talented spiritual director. He recorded his method in a celebrated treatise called the *Spiritual Exercises*, a simple set of meditations, prayers, and other mental exercises, first published in 1548.

Ignatius was beatified in 1609, and then canonized, receiving the title of Saint on March 12, 1622. His feast day is celebrated on July 31. He is the patron saint of the Basque provinces of Gipuzkoa and Biscay as well as the Society of Jesus, and was declared patron saint of all spiritual retreats by Pope Pius XI in 1922. Ignatius is also a foremost patron saint of soldiers. *Wikipedia*

## Feast Day — August 1



**Saint Alphonsus Liguori** (27 September 1696–1 August 1787) was an Italian Catholic bishop, spiritual writer, composer, musician, artist, poet, lawyer, scholastic philosopher, and theologian.

He founded the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (the Redemptorists). In 1762 he was appointed Bishop of Sant'Agata dei Goti. A prolific writer, he published nine editions of his *Moral Theology* in his lifetime, in addition to other devotional and ascetic works and letters. Among his best known

works are *The Glories of Mary* and *The Way of the Cross*, the latter still used in parishes during Lenten devotions.

He was canonized in 1839 by Pope Gregory XVI and proclaimed a Doctor of the Church by Pope Pius IX in 1871. One of the most widely read Catholic authors, he is the patron saint of confessors.
