**A NOTE FROM
DCN. GEORGE . . .**

As I have mentioned in the past, I am an immigrant and my family came to the United States when I was around two years old. We were poor when

I was young. I guess you could call us “lower-middle class.” My father worked two jobs as a butcher and a slaughterer and later as a building guard at Cornell University. My mother worked cleaning doctors’ offices, houses and as a seamstress. Even though we didn’t have much, we always seemed to have enough to eat. My mother had been trained in Poland as a cook, and she was able to put together some fantastic meals. I still fondly recall the holiday treats that she made from scratch, and her Thanksgiving dinners were memorable.

Sometimes our Thanksgiving dinners were overshadowed by sorrows and troubles or conflicts within our family, but no matter what, my mother was steadfast in making a meal that would be remembered. However, when my mother reached her 80’s, she developed Alzheimer’s, and so finally, we moved Thanksgiving to my house where my wife and I did all of the cooking. My mother was heartbroken that she couldn’t cook for us anymore. Cooking meant the world to her. It was her expression of love for her family and for all of the others who were invited to my parents’ home at Thanksgiving time. Even when she was in a nursing home and confused in her Alzheimer’s, she still thought of cooking. Whenever I stopped by to see her, she would say that she was sorry that she didn’t have time to bake anything for me (even though she didn’t recognize me anymore).

Food is our way of showing love for one another. In the Gospels, you see that food was important to Jesus, as well. When he resurrected someone from the dead, his typical response was “give (him/her) something to eat.” When he, himself, rose from the dead, he asked his disciples if they had something for him to eat. When he appeared to them on the shores of Galilee after his resurrection, he asked them if they would like something to eat. Jesus, himself, gives us special food from Heaven. He gives us his body and blood. We call this food “Eucharist,” which in Greek means “Thanksgiving.”

Thanksgiving is a time for giving thanks, for the love that we share, and for food that we share. While our Thanksgiving celebrations may not always be perfect, there is one perfect Thanksgiving celebration that we can be part of every time we come to Mass—when we eat the bread and drink the wine and share in the divinity of Christ.

My son, John, who passed away three years ago, would always go over to my mother’s house and say, “Grandma, what’s there to eat?” She would smile and bring out food that came from her heart. Jesus does the same for you and me. Happy Thanksgiving!





STEWARDSHIP MOMENTS

We may long to hear the Lord say to us, "Well done, good and faithful servant," as He does with the first two servants mentioned in the Parable of the Talents in today's Gospel from Matthew. However, although the third servant did not squander or waste the gifts (talents) he had received, the Master's reaction was not the same. As we have often stated, stewardship is an active way of life. There is nothing passive about it. The Lord expects us to do things, to take the gifts we receive and to share them and multiply them, as was the case in the first two servants cited in the parable. If we really wish to hear the Lord say, "Well done, good and faithful servant" to us when we are finally judged, we need to do something to earn that praise. The key word in that sentence is "do." There is nothing spiritual or abstract about being ready for Jesus' return and judgment of us. God has gifted us in a multitude of ways. We need to recognize those gifts; acknowledge those gifts; be grateful for those gifts; and most of all use those gifts to benefit the Church and others. What have we done with our time, our money, and our abilities? In our Church we recognize and point to sins of omission — that is, things we did not do, but should have. Like the first two servants in the parable, it is not just a case of preserving what God has given us, it is a case of using it, increasing it, and returning it to the Lord.

(No. 7).
