Around thirty years ago, when I was a Volunteer Firefighter, we had a forest fire in the Town of Danby on a dry July night. It turned out that someone had gone to an isolated spot off of Bald Hill Road and set off fireworks, which started the fire. The firefighters had to be driven up an old logging road to the top of a hill, and then we had to repel down the steep side of the hill with “Indian tanks” on our backs to fight the fire. “Indian tanks” are metal tanks filled with water that are strapped to the back of a firefighter, and the water is sprayed from a manual pump attached to the tank. They are bulky and heavy.

That night I was recovering from a bout of pneumonia, but I went to fight the fire anyway. In the end, I was overcome by smoke inhalation, and I had to be pulled from the fire area and given oxygen, and finally sent home. That experience, and many others that I have had as a firefighter, has given me an appreciation for the work that firefighters are doing out in California, where they are battling the worst fires that the state has had in a long time.



As I stated earlier, fire is an unpredictable force. It can move almost like a living thing, and it can surprise you. It takes faith, endurance, and courage in fighting a fire. Let us offer our prayers for the firefighters, the first responders, and the victims of these massive fires. Also, let us remember in our prayers the first responders and the victims of the hurricanes and earthquakes that struck recently in the United States and its territories, Mexico, and Latin America, and of the mass shooting in Las Vegas. There is much suffering happening around us, but as St. Paul states in our Second Reading today, “We give thanks to God always for all of you, remembering you in our prayers, unceasingly calling to mind your work of faith and labor of love and endurance in hope of our Lord Jesus Christ...(1 Thes 1:3-4).”





WORLD MISSION SUNDAY

Today is World Mission Sunday! Each October, this celebration leads us to the heart of our Christian faith—leads us to mission, as Pope Francis explains. On this day, we are called—as baptized Catholics—to celebrate and support local churches in Asia and Africa, the Pacific Islands, and parts of Latin America and Europe, an area that covers more than half the territory of the globe. Through the work and witness of mission priests, religious and lay leaders, the poor receive practical help and experience God's love and mercy, His hope and peace. This year, we are invited as well into a special opportunity to engage with Pope Francis and learn more about his missions. To do so, simply scan the image on the poster you seeing hanging in your parish or visit ChatWithThePope.org.

STEWARDSHIP MOMENTS

The last line of today's Gospel Reading from St. Matthew contains one of the more well known of Jesus' quotes. When asked a bit of a trick question by the Pharisees, "Is it lawful to pay the census tax to Caesar or not?" Jesus responds by asking them whose image is on their Roman coins, to which they respond simply "Caesar's." Jesus' response to their reply is known to most of us, "Then repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God." The Lord's answer is far more perceptive than we might think, and it gives another message to us, one we must always remember. If we are followers of Christ, and if we work to be His disciple, the Lord might ask us, "Whose image is on your soul?" We have learned in the First Chapter of Genesis that God created us in His image. The coin may be stamped with Caesar's image, but each of us is stamped with God's image. Thus, Jesus is implying that the coin may be Caesar's but each of us belongs to God. In that regard we should be striving to be all those things to which Jesus called us. That is in effect what a stewardship way of life is — recognizing that God is in each of us, we are to place ourselves in service to God and to one another. That is what is really meant by "Then repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God."
