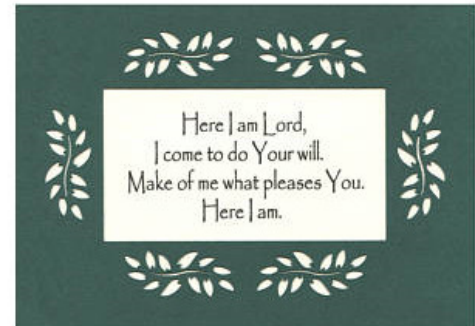

**A NOTE FROM
FR. DANIEL . . .**

I was a stranger, and you welcomed me

Yesterday we concluded National Migration Week, a time set aside by the Bishops of the United States to invite all Catholics to reflect on the realities of migration and to act according to what the Social Doctrine of the Church teaches—mainly that, God created heaven and earth and that the resources on this earth are meant to provide for all of God’s children without distinction of race, gender or nationality; that no nation can claim ownership of those resources or of the land in exclusion of any of God’s children as long as that nation is sitting on the earth that God created and that belongs to God and to all of God’s children; and that it is at the core of scriptural teaching both in the Old and the New Testaments that we ought to welcome the stranger. This week is an opportunity to call Americans to allow the Holy Spirit, that guided our founding Fathers to declare this land one free nation under God with equality and opportunities for all men and women, the same Spirit that has guided this nation to become a model for the world by crying out: "Give me your tired, Your poor, Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore. Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door!", the same Holy Spirit that has made Americans great, humble, generous, welcoming, and compassionate will continue to guide us.

Our Bishop has asked that this year we focus our Public Policy efforts on the issue of immigration and particularly on the DREAM Act. The Dream Act of 2017 (S.1615 / H.R. 3440) is a bipartisan bill that was introduced in the Senate on July 20, 2017 and in the House on July 26, 2017. It would protect an estimated 1.8 million immigrant youth from deportation, including the approximately 790,000 Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) recipients. The bill offers qualifying immigrant youth, including current DACA recipients, “conditional permanent resident status” and a path to full lawful permanent residency and eventual citizenship. To receive the conditional status, the youth must, among other requirements: have entered the U.S. as a child; been continuously present in the United States for at least four years prior to enactment of the bill; meet certain admissibility and security requirements, including a background check; and been admitted to an institution of higher education or have obtained or be pursuing secondary education. The bill allows recipients of this conditional status to obtain non-conditional lawful permanent residency if recipients satisfy requirements that include: background checks; demonstrated English proficiency, as well as knowledge of U.S. history and civics; and either education in a higher learning institution, honorable military service, three years of employment in the United States, or a hardship exception.

Bishop John Wester: "Those who would benefit from the DREAM Act are talented, intelligent, and dedicated young persons who know only the United States as their home. They can become some of the future leaders of our country, provided we are wise enough to provide them the opportunity to pursue their dreams...Importantly, this legislation will apply to students in both public and private education, including those attending Catholic schools...The DREAM Act represents a practical, fair, and compassionate solution for thousands of young persons in our nation who simply want to reach their God-given potential and contribute to the well-being of our nation."

We are obliged to hear this call of Scripture, of the Doctrine of the Church, of our Bishops, the successors of the Apostles, and I invite you to do so in two ways: 1) by signing the petition regarding the Dream Act that will be available at our churches on January 20 and 21 and 2) by praying:

Prayer for National Migration Week (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops)

MERCIFUL AND LOVING FATHER, We beseech you, open our hearts so that we may provide hospitality and refuge to migrants who are lonely, afraid, and far from their homes. Give us the courage to welcome every stranger as Christ in our midst, to invite them into our communities as a demonstration of Christ’s love for us. We pray that when we encounter the other, we see in her the face of your Son, when we meet a stranger, that we take his hand in welcome. Help us to live in solidarity with one another, to seek justice for those who are persecuted and comfort for those who are suffering. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

YEAR OF THE EUCHARIST

From Pope Francis’ Catechesis on the Eucharist on November 8, 2017: *“The Eucharist is a wondrous event in which Jesus Christ, our life, makes himself present. Participating in the Mass “is truly living again the redemptive passion and death of Our Lord. It is a visible manifestation: the Lord makes himself present on the altar to be offered to the Father for the salvation of the world” (Homily at the Domus Sanctae Marthae, 10 February 2014). The Lord is there with us, present. So often do we go there, look at things, talk amongst ourselves while the priest is celebrating the Eucharist ... and we do not celebrate close to Him. But it is the Lord! If today the President of the Republic were to come, or some very important world personage, it is certain that we would all be close to him, that we would want to greet him. But think: when you go to Mass, the Lord is there! And you get distracted. It is the Lord! We have to think about this. “Father, it’s that the Masses are dull” — “But what are you saying, that the Lord is dull?” — “No, no. Not the Mass, the priests” — “Ah, may the priests convert, but it is the Lord who is there!” Do you understand? Do not forget it. “Participating in Mass is living again the redemptive passion and death of Our Lord.”*

Let us build this expectation in our hearts, that when we come to Mass we come to encounter Jesus. Let us prepare our hearts for this encounter and truly dedicate this hour to Him, be attentive to everything that happens, everything that is said, everything that the Lord says through our feelings and thoughts during this privileged time of intimacy with Him. **What can I do to be more present to the Mass?**

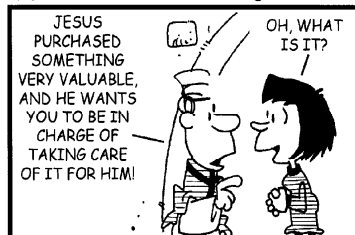
