

ne day at my job at Cornell University, a woman, who was a staff employee, approached me and asked if she could speak to me in private. I said sure, but I wondered what she wanted to talk about. When we sat down in a conference room, she opened up to me about an experience that she had in a Catholic Church that caused her and her family to leave the Church. It was sad to hear how someone representing the Church had broken her trust and made her feel unwanted.

During this Lent, I have been reading a book called "Forming Intentional Disciples" by Sherry Anne Weddell. Sherry Anne Weddell co-founded, with Father Michael Sweeny, the *Catherine of Siena Institute*, a ministry of the Western Dominican Province. The mission of the Institute is to equip parishes to form lay apostles, who can go forth and spread the faith. In the book, Ms. Weddell addresses the problem of people leaving the Church. She learned that the fastest-growing religious group in the United States are the "unaffiliated," which she calls the "nones." While the "nones" may not have a religious affiliation, studies have found that at least 75% of them are religious to some degree. Many of the "nones" come from Catholic and Protestant Christianity. In fact, the Pew Research group found that only 30% of Americans who were raised Catholic are still "practicing," which means going to Mass at least once a month.

Over the past 20 years that I have been a Deacon, I have talked with a variety of people of different age groups about their reasons for leaving the Church. There are many issues, some of which you probably already know and have discussed yourselves. They can be issues involving Church teaching; or something a priest said or did that was offensive; or because of sickness, hardship and death, which can cause people to turn away from God and from the Church. The common theme in all of these cases is that a person felt that he or she was hurt or let down by the Church.

All of these reasons for leaving the Church should be considered when we speak and reach out to these people, who have left the Church. As Sherry Weddell points out in her book, we are all disciples of Christ, and so it is up to all of us to reach out to those who feel apart from the Church and not condemn them, but to love them. The example of the Father in the parable of the Prodigal Son should be the model for us to follow; to love unconditionally.

As Lent draws to a close and we approach the time of Holy Week and the great feast of Easter, let us strive to be disciples of Christ. Let us be more loving, more forgiving, and in turn, become beacons of light that will draw the lost and the estranged back to the God who loves them.

YEAR OF THE EUCHARIST

During Lent, the Prayers we have used during Mass have made special reference to the healing power of the Eucharist. As we continue this journey and seek to renew our lives and leave sin behind, our greatest help is in the Most Holy Eucharist. Coming to Mass as often as possible, and going to Holy Communion.

The Eucharist brings about spiritual healing by cleansing us from sin and restoring us in charity. In the Catechism, this effect of the Eucharist is compared to the effect of natural food. "As bodily nourishment restores lost strength, so the Eucharist strengthens our charity, which tends to be weakened in daily life; and this living charity wipes away venial sins" (CCC 1394). The Catechism goes on to quote St. Ambrose, who speaks of the Eucharist as a remedy for sin and concludes, "Because I always sin, I should always have a remedy." The Catechism also teaches that "the Eucharist preserves us from future mortal sins" though "it is not ordered to the forgiveness of mortal sins [which] is proper to the sacrament of Reconciliation" (CCC 1395). The Eucharist does not have the same healing purpose as the sacrament of Reconciliation, but it does have a healing purpose.

Invite others to come to Mass, come often and come with faith, in the healing power of the Eucharist, in Jesus' power to heal you and bring you peace.

What are you asking healing for this week as you come to celebrate the Eucharist?
